

# I'm writing this from my home, away from the crowd. The streets are quiet. We are hearing of the 'State of Emergency' starting to affect many people. With all the daily changes that affirms, whether in the same room or in self-isolation, we are "Together on the Way" as a Church desiring to live life like Jesus, for Jesus, and in the power of His Spirit.

from the crowd. The streets are quiet. We are hearing of the 'State of Emergency' starting to affect many people. With all the daily changes affecting us and our societies, we might hear of and see a few negative behaviours which tear society down; things like selfishness, hoarding, fear. But we also see the kindness of people who are building up others; changing behaviours to prevent the spread of infection, helping or checking in on neighbours, being generous and thoughtful, kind and loving. Examples include a roof-top fitness trainer instructing people from separated balconies, the singing of the Italian National Anthem from balconies and windows of Italian homes, or the "caremongering" Facebook groups popping up across Canada.

Even as we postpone and cancel public events, we celebrate a common purpose with Jesus and one another As followers of Jesus, and as members of the "Evangelical Missionary Church of Canada", we have a recognition that our story – yours and mine, is not merely a human story, but also a Divine one. We don't need to create a false sense of what unites us, but we get to keep and cherish that which God provides for our unity in his Great Commission call. Together with the Global Body of Christ, we live for our King, welcoming the gifts of all the parts of the Body, the Global Church.

In Ephesians 4, the Apostle's interest is for Jewish and non-Jewish followers of Jesus to honour a unity that is Godgiven, a faith that is shared, a way of life that is committed to one cause – to follow Jesus together in the world, from

very different cultural vantage points, and from very different backgrounds. Right now, we see a different kind of "difference", that of our opinion and faith responses in light of Covid-19. But underneath those differences is our common bond as members of one household.

Make every effort to keep the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace.

Ephesians 4:3 (NIVUK)

While giving space for one another's differences, we make a declaration that there is One Lord, One faith, one new birth (see Ephesians 4:4-6).

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We might also lay down pride, ethnocentrism, xenophobia, or selfishness. Rather than only seeing the work of the Church through the ways we've grown accustomed to experiencing them, we focus instead on our common calling, our common cause. When Ephesians 4 gets to verse 16, we read further about our unity in the whole Body of Christ as held together mysteriously by the Spirit, connecting all the parts:

From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Ephesians 4:16 NIVUK

We not only have a God-given unity, but are held together, with all the parts of the Body, by the Spirit of God as well. This enables the growing and building up of one whole Church, as we operate and work from our common identity and purpose in Jesus' Community. This keeps us humble, welcoming the gifts of every member as contributing to the whole. It keeps us mindful to bless and encourage each other in doing our part.

Jesus prayed that we might be one.

...that all of them may be one, Father, just as you are in me and I am in you. May they also be in us so that the world may believe that you have sent me. John 17:21 NIVUK

Even though we experience separation from others right now, we embrace being Together on the Way. We have a story to live, and a song to sing. Let the Way of Jesus be experienced in your public sphere today. We uphold Jesus' cause in our lives, with gratitude, with allegiance to keep Jesus in the center of our view, allowing His unity of purpose to be lived out in our homes, our networks, our neighbourhoods, and our world.



## REPRESENTING JESUS IN THE MIDST OF A PANDEMIC

As I write this note, I am in self-isolation in my home for the next 14 days as I have just returned from out of country while doing some Disciple-Making training in the US. We received news of the need for self-isolation while we were abroad. I am now settling into my new normal for this period of time in our current situation.

It is important that we all take the necessary precautions that Health Canada and the Provincial Health Ministers are recommending and requiring of us to help slow the spread of the virus in our communities. This helps the elderly and most vulnerable among us, which is always on the heart of God.

Having said that, it is also important that we hear another voice speak into our hearts from Isaiah 41:8-10:

But you, O Israel, my servant, Jacob, whom I have chosen, you descendants of Abraham my friend, I took you from the ends of the earth, from its farthest corners I called you. I said, 'You are my servant'; I have chosen you and have not rejected you. So do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God. I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand.

In this text, we see that God has invited us into a relationship with Him, equipped us as servants and empowers us with His very presence to face whatever fears we may have. He also sends us out to represent Him to a broken and hurting world. As one article I read yesterday puts it: "Christianity has been handling epidemics for 2000 years. Practical theology says care, sacrifice, and community are as vital as ever." May God be glorified through the attitudes, behaviours and character responses of His kids in the season that is now upon us.

Jim Denison wrote in his blog:

One of the ways God wants to redeem this crisis is by showing us how much we need Him. But the Lord also wants to redeem it by showing us how much we need each other. It is difficult to make sacrifices that don't seem necessary at the time. If (Canada) were Italy and huge numbers of us were sick and dying we would obviously see the need for social distancing and other sacrifices for the common good. However, to keep their experience from becoming ours, we must act as if it were. The key is to reframe personal sacrifice as service to others.

I just got off a Zoom call with the BC EMCC pastors as we focused on this text of Isaiah 41:8-10, where we talked about the voices in our culture saying:

- "Be afraid: lots of us could die!" (and for those who are older and immune-compromised, this is a particularly pointed and possible reality for them);
- 2. "Don't be afraid we will all get through this" (this second voice does work to a point, as we all work to "flatten the curve").

But there is the third voice from God saying, "So do not fear, for I am with you!" It was a great time of sharing and hearing from the Holy Spirit as we face the challenging time at hand. It was also good to share the peace of Christ with each other in our journey this day.

And so, may the peace that passes all understanding, guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus. May His peace be the sentinel over your heart that keeps you from worry and fear, and the sentinel over your mind that keeps you from doubt and self-reliance.

Blessings to you all during these challenging days, and may you be salt, light and leaven to your hurting and fearful communities. For, we have the spiritual confidence from our Heavenly Father to live and lead in a pandemic plagued world (ls. 41:10).

## A CONVICTION TO WALK TOGETHER

Growing a partnership across cultures is challenging, but deeply rewarding. For many years, our Albright Church in Winnipeg has been connected with the Church in a remote area of Gens de Nantes (GDN), Haiti. But when Joey, Lindsey and Lorna travelled to Haiti in November with World Partners facilitators, and sat in a listening posture with Richard, Mis. Ketely, Herlynda, Hernso, Emmanuel, and Sammy, something amazing happened.

"The hope they have is so contagious", Joey reflected. "The GDN friends filled the wall with post-it notes, accounting for all the ways God has resourced them to be a blessing to their communities."

Some of the deepest learnings came from shared Biblical reflections on resource-mobilization. Adding to the listing of God-given gifts, talents and resources, the chance to meditate together on scripture rooted the remaining conversations.

Responding to the miraculous story of the oil that did not run dry for the widow (2 Kings 4:1-7), and the challenge of trusting provision by seeking first God's Kingdom and righteousness (Matthew 6:30-44), the group wrestled with their own perceived needs and resources, and how they would allow Jesus to interact with them (like the widow and the disciples) to apply these insights. The team sought to connect God's vision for GDN's future with the realities of community life facing each leader.



#### Dr. Emmanuel:

"It is funny for me, that while I am living in GDN, I needed a team from Canada to help me identify what resources are here, knowing time is a resource... and some of the things we are dreaming for, make me understand that can be reality-vision can come true, hope [in our] partnerships can last, [and that we, as] leaders from GDN, [can] learn to live like brothers and sisters."

One GDN leader remarked, "God can solve the problem of the [shortage of physical] resources, and provide when we use what we have been given to meet the needs of others."

When we work from this posture of everyone being resourced by God as our Source of all-sufficiency, we grow in our sense of mutuality, as we see what each person brings to the table. It's not the amounts, but our equal value as receivers and givers in God's [Kingdom] work.

This is an amazing gift, to constantly ask how the resources, strengths and gifts of our global partners might bring fresh challenge, inspiration, and hope for us as we serve Jesus where He has placed us.

So what are you going to do with this information?

#### Reflect

- How can we learn from the resilient hope of our Haitian brothers and sisters, and apply it to our participation in Jesus' mission?
- How can we bring the whole Gospel (everything good that Jesus showed us and all we've been given to share), so we might join Him in bringing transformation to our neighbourhoods?
