At the same time, we place our trust in Jesus. During this interim period, we are doing the hard work of reorganizing and right-sizing in order to provide support to our churches. We are asking the questions: "what are our core services that we should/can provide our churches? In 2021, it is our intent to begin incorporating World Partners Services into our Common Cause thinking and giving. In addition to serving our Global Workers (Missionaries), our World Partners Team members are available to serve our local churches through consultations, learning, connecting and mobilizing with the goal of helping us follow Jesus on mission to the world. As you prepare your budgets this fall, thanks in advance for prayerfully and intentionally including your Common Cause gift. An extra one-time gift would be a timely blessing to us. We do certainly understand the financial challenges you face on the local level and encourage you to steward well the gifts God entrusts to you.
